

## Suggested Schedule for a Year of Study

There are 45 lessons total. If you do two lessons per week, you'll finish this study in 26 weeks. You may only get to one lesson each week. You may get to four lessons. It's entirely up to you. I have a recommended schedule below that offers a breakdown of two lessons each week with week 4 being your catch-up week.

The important thing to remember is that you control your curriculum – your curriculum should never control you or your students. So be at peace going at your own pace.

## Picture Booklist by Lesson

There are a plethora of wonderful picture books featuring birds around the world but the books listed below offer the opportunity for students to build *joyful relations through* story specifically with the birds Burgess tells us about.

\*Please note while I researched books for hours trying to adhere to the living book recommendations, several books do not fit into this category and were chosen for their childlike, whimsical prose and overall message featuring North American birds in each lesson. I tried to offer more than one suggestion should you be unable to secure them all at your local library. Sadly, many of the classical bird books are now out of print.

HELPFUL TIP: I recommend gathering the picture books from the library for the first 8 lessons before you begin Lesson 1.

## Burgess Birds: A Simple Studies Guide Lessons

## Lesson 1

#### **MATERIALS NEEDED:**

- The Burgess Bird Book for Children
- Field Guide
- Birds Coloring Pages (provided) (one per student)
- Colored Pencils
- Picture Books see below (optional)
- Emily Dickinson's Poem (provided)(optional)

(optional) Read aloud Emily Dickinson's poem, "Hope is the Thing with Feathers." Consider having students memorize this poem (regular prompts will be provided).

Read together, *The Burgess Bird Book for Children*, chapter 1, "Jenny Wren Arrives," and ask for an oral narration. Let your students color the picture of the House Wren on page 1 in the *Bird Coloring Pages (provided)*.

**Older Students:** Introduce the Bird Field Guide you will be using throughout this study to your students. Demonstrate how to locate specific bird species in the alphabetized index section of the guide. Let students know they have unrestricted access to utilize the guide to further their study and use a constant resource.

#### ADDITIONAL NOTE

\*In our experience, older students often begin to ask to use the field guide as a reference when using their nature journals. Try not to force older students too quickly in the journey of discovering more about each bird. Generally speaking, the longer they listen to the story, and if we as instructors model researching habits by keeping the field guide handy for reference for backyard birds, the more interested they become and will eventually begin researching birds they're naturally most curious about without our assistance.

## Lesson 3

#### **MATERIALS NEEDED:**

- The Burgess Bird Book for Children
- Field Guide
- Birds Coloring Pages (provided) (one per student)
- Nature Journal (one per student)
- Colored Pencils
- Picture Books see below (optional)
- Handbook of Nature Study (optional)
- Emily Dickinson's Poem (provided)(optional)
- Computer (optional)

#### (optional) Read aloud Emily Dickinson's poem aloud.

Ask the students what they recall from last time's reading about Bully the English Sparrow.

Read together, *The Burgess Bird Book for Children*, chapter 3, "Jenny Has a Good Word For Some Sparrows," and ask for an oral narration. Let your students color the picture of the Song Sparrow on page 3 of the *Bird Coloring Pages (provided)*.

Older Students: Using a field guide, have students look up the Song, White-throated and Fox Sparrows. Let students choose which one to draw in their nature journal, making sure to record and label their findings.

## Lesson 9

#### MATERIALS NEEDED:

- The Burgess Bird Book for Children
- Field Guide
- Birds Coloring Pages (provided) (one per student)
- Nature Journal (one per student)
- Colored Pencils
- Picture Books see below (optional)
- Handbook of Nature Study (optional)
- Emily Dickinson's Poem (provided)(optional)
- Computer (optional)

(optional) Read aloud Emily Dickinson's poem. Continue memorization and recitation.

Ask the students what they recall from last time's reading about Peewee and the different types of birds nests.

Read together, *The Burgess Bird Book for Children*, chapter 9, "Longbill and Teeter," and ask for an oral narration. Ask students if they've ever witnessed one of these unique birds in person, perhaps at the seashore. Let your students color the picture of the Woodcock on page 9 of the *Bird Coloring Pages (provided)*.

**Older students:** Using a field guide, have students look up the Spotted Sandpiper and Woodcock. Let students choose which one(s) to draw in their nature journal, making sure to record and label their findings.

## Lesson 17

#### **MATERIALS NEEDED:**

- The Burgess Bird Book for Children
- Field Guide
- Birds Coloring Pages (provided) (one per student)
- Nature Journal (one per student)
- Colored Pencils
- Picture Books see below (optional)
- Handbook of Nature Study (optional)
- Emily Dickinson's Poem (provided)(optional)

(optional) Read aloud Emily Dickinson's poem. Ask students to begin reciting as much of the poem as possible on their own.

Ask the students what they recall from last time's reading about Forktail the Barn Swallow and Twitter the Martin.

Read together, *The Burgess Bird Book for Children*, chapter 17, "More Robbers," and ask for an oral narration. Let your students color the picture of the Blue Jay on page 17 of the *Bird Coloring Pages (provided)*.

Older Students: Using a field guide, have students look up the Crow and Blue Jay. Let students choose which one(s) to draw in their nature journal, making sure to record and label their findings. Not only do we want to encourage students to look up Latin names and migration patterns, but to use maps to identify whether or not the student has the opportunity to witness these birds in their own state can be also helpful.
